

# 2009 BEAT THE ODDS® AWARDS DINNER

# A Celebration of Five Extraordinary Young People

The Children's Defense Fund (CDF) began the Beat the Odds® program in 1990 to highlight the positive potential of young people. Too often we hear about teens getting into trouble, dropping out of school, becoming involved with drugs, crime or gangs, or becoming parents too soon. Rarely recognized are the many young people who do well despite facing overwhelming obstacles, such as poverty, violence, homelessness, family break-up or substance abuse, that can stand in the way of even the smallest achievements.

CDF works with local education advocates to select and honor students like Natasha Bridge, a 2006 award recipient, who despite a traumatic childhood of abuse and neglect has "no regrets" but instead continues to demonstrate academic excellence and the strength and determination to "beat the odds." These outstanding young people have been honored locally for personal achievements to improve their own lives as well as the lives of others. At special awards ceremonies, CDF celebrates their remarkable lives and the families, friends, teachers and counselors who helped them find the strength within themselves to succeed. Each student is presented with a scholarship and other prizes in recognition of his or her accomplishments.

Beat the Odds celebrations inspire community leaders and citizens who want to help children struggling to overcome adversity. The program has fostered additional successes by serving as a catalyst for community efforts on behalf of children, as in the case of Kyle Corfman, a 2007 award receipient who found a "valuable mentor" in his lacrosse coach as he persevered through a heartbreaking childhood involving his father's chronic illness and the death of his mother. These award events convey several important messages. First, society becomes more aware of the difficult reality and obstacles some children must face and overcome in their daily lives. By telling a personal story about the effects of the grim

circumstances in which these children live, the program can help spur community-wide action to improve the lives of those in similar situations.

In addition, *Beat the Odds* events demonstrate that behind each successful child is at least one caring adult. It could be a parent or other relative, a coach or a teacher, a school counselor or neighbor—someone who took the time to believe in that child and help him or her along the way. By recognizing the student's accomplishments and noting the assistance they received, a clear and powerful message comes through—every adult can do something to help more children thrive and succeed.

Finally, publicly honoring young people who have persevered through tremendous adversity provides positive role models for youths in similar situations. They feel, sometimes appropriately, that no one appreciates their pain or recognizes what they have had to overcome to reach even the most modest of goals. These events send a clear signal that someone does care, and that someone does understand what it took to stay in school and do well.
