Child Poverty in America 2013: State Analysis



September 29, 2014

State data released by the U.S. Census Bureau on September 18, 2014 reveal that child poverty remains at record high levels in the states, and that the highest rates are for children of color and young children.

Forty-two States Still Have Higher Child Poverty Rates than Pre-Recession

Four years after the official end of the recession, 42 states still had child poverty rates that were statistically significantly higher than when the recession began, ranging from 7 percent higher in Oklahoma to 48 percent higher in Nevada (see Appendix Table 2). Eight states and the District of Columbia had child poverty rates in 2013 that were essentially the same as in 2007: Alaska, Colorado, Kentucky, Louisiana, New Hampshire, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming.

Only Eight States Experienced Statistically Significant Drops in Child Poverty Since 2012

A total of 10 states experienced statistically significant changes in child poverty from 2012 to 2013: eight states saw decreases in child poverty and two states (West Virginia and New Jersey) saw increases.

Child Poverty Rates in 2013

- In 2013, the rate of children living in poverty ranged from 10.2 percent in New Hampshire to 34.0 percent in Mississippi. A child in Mississippi was over three times more likely to be poor than a child in New Hampshire.
- In 12 states and the District of Columbia more than 25 percent of children were poor.
- All but one of the 10 states with the highest child poverty rates were in the South.

In 2013, poverty is defined as an annual income below \$23,834 for the average family of four — \$1,986 a month, \$458 a week, or \$65 a day.

Young Children Continue to Suffer from Higher Poverty Rates

- In 2013, the rate of poverty for children under 6 years of age ranged from 12 percent in New Hampshire to 38.1 percent in Mississippi. In all states except Hawaii and the District of Columbia, poverty in children under age 6 was higher than among all children.
- In 21 states, more than 25 percent of children under 6 lived in poverty. In nine states more than 30 percent of children under 6 were poor. Only four states had fewer than 15 percent of young children in poverty.
- All but one of the 10 states with the highest poverty rates among young children were in the South.

Extreme Child Poverty

- In 2012, the percent of children living in extreme poverty ranged from 5.1 percent in New Hampshire to 16.9 percent in Mississippi.
- In 19 states and the District of Columbia, more than 10 percent of children were extremely poor.
- Extreme poverty is defined as an annual income of less than half of the poverty level: \$11,917 a year, \$993 a month, \$229 a week, or \$33 a day for the average family of four.

Extreme Child Poverty in Children Under 6

- In 2012, the percent of children under 6 living in extreme poverty ranged from 5.3 percent in North Dakota to 19.4 percent in Mississippi.
- In 28 states and the District of Columbia, more than 10 percent of children under 6 were extremely poor.

Children of Color

Across the states, children of color continue to disproportionately suffer from poverty, with the youngest children of color experiencing the highest rates.

Black Children

- In 20 states and the District of Columbia, more than 40 percent of Black children were poor. In three states — Maine, Mississippi and Wisconsin — more than half of Black children were poor.

Hispanic Children

- In 2013, the poverty rate for Hispanic children ranged from 4.5 percent in Vermont to 50.2 percent in Rhode Island.
- In 35 states, more than 30 percent of Hispanic children were poor. Eight states had Hispanic child poverty rates of 40 percent or more.

Asian Children

- Asian children had the lowest rates of child poverty. In 2013, the poverty rate for Asian children ranged from 1.2 percent in New Hampshire to 27.5 percent in South Carolina.
- Only eight states and the District of Columbia had Asian child poverty rates above 20 percent. In 15 states, fewer than 10 percent of Asian children were poor.

American Indian/Alaska Native Children

- In 2013, the poverty rate for American Indian/Alaska Native children ranged from 4.2 percent in Tennessee to 68.7 percent in Mississippi.
- In 27 states, more than 30 percent of American Indian/Alaska Native children were poor.

Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander Children

- In 2013, among the eight states with large enough Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander populations, child poverty ranged from 19.1 percent in Nevada to 62.8 percent in Arizona.
- All eight states had a poverty rate above 15 percent for Pacific Islander children.

Children of Two or More Races

- In 2013, children of two or more races were 5 percent of the total child population. Their poverty rate ranged from 9.5 percent in Alaska to 44.6 percent in West Virginia.
- Nearly half of states had a poverty rate above 25 percent for children of two or more races.
