

# A State Fact Sheet for Grandparents and Other Relatives Raising Children

## Oklahoma

April 2008

### In Oklahoma...

- There are 57,601 children living in grandparent-headed households (6.5% of all children in the state). There are another 14,825 children living in households headed by other relatives (1.7%). Of the children living in households headed by grandparents or other relatives in Nebraska, 34,185 are living there without either parent present.
- 39,2379 grandparents report they are responsible for their grandchildren living with them (5,218 in Oklahoma City and 3,482 in Tulsa): 13% of these grandparents are African American, 5% are Hispanic/Latino; 12% are American Indian or Alaskan Native; and 65% are White. 61% of these grandparents live in households without the children's parents present. 71% are under the age of 60; 20% live in poverty.

## Children in Foster Care

- Sometimes state child welfare agencies place children in foster care with grandparents or other relatives. This is often called “kinship care.”

## Numbers – April 2008

- There were 11,648 children under the care of the Oklahoma Department of Human Services, Children and Family Division. Of these children, 3,884 were placed with relatives.

## Preferences and licensing

- State policy requires that kin be considered first when an out-of-home placement is sought for a child under the Department’s care.
- There is no separate licensing program for kinship foster parents.
- Payment for relatives is the same as for foster parents providing non-kinship care.

## Training and support

- Children and Family Services Division provides OKPRIDE (Oklahoma Parents Resource, Information, Development and Education) - training, assessment and selection of prospective kinship, foster and adoptive resource parents.

## Supported Permanency

- Supported permanency is available to relatives within the fifth degree of relationship who have been caring for an eligible child in child welfare custody and who are receiving a foster care payment; program also provides assistance with the costs of filing for guardianship.

## Public Benefits

### Relative Support Program

- Provides assistance statewide to eligible relatives within the fifth degree of relationship to a child for whom they are caring on a full-time basis, regardless of the legal status of the child to the relative
- Flexible voucher program aimed at preventing child welfare involvement
- Funds available for Medicaid, child care, school supplies, activity fees, clothing, shelter-related expenses, legal issues related to obtaining guardianship or legal custody, counseling services for child or caregiver

## State Laws

The following state law may be helpful to grandparents and other relatives raising children<sup>1</sup>:

### Medical Consent

#### Okla. Stat. Ann. tit. 10, § 170.1

- Allows a parent or other person with legal custody or guardianship to authorize, in writing, any adult person caring for the child to consent to medical or dental treatment
- The affidavit is not valid for more than one year, unless the relative has legal custody

### Preference for Grandparents and Other Suitable Relatives

#### Okla. Stat. Ann. Tit. 10 § 22

- Children who have been abused, dependent or neglected or whose parents are unwilling to provide care for them are best served when they can be cared for by grandparents or other suitable relatives instead of placing those children in foster care
- Requires the state government to conduct an interim study on the needs of grandparents and other relatives raising children and explore those measures appropriate to address them

### Education Consent

#### Okla. Stat. Ann. tit. 70, § 1-113

- Each school district may allow for the establishment of a child’s residency by affidavit.
- The child may be enrolled in school when an adult who resides in the school district and has assumed permanent care and custody of the child files an affidavit with the school district.
- The adult does not have to have formal legal custody of the child.
