

Children's Defense Fund Child Poverty in America 2014: State Analysis



September 2015

State data released by the U.S. Census Bureau on September 17, 2015 reveal that child poverty in 2014 remains at record high levels in the states. Children are the poorest age group, and the poorest are children of color and those under age six. Only two states (Kentucky and West Virginia) had White, non-Hispanic child poverty rates higher than 20 percent, whereas only one state (Hawaii) had Black child poverty rates lower than 20 percent. Only 10 states experienced statistically significant decreases in child poverty rates between 2013 and 2014. In order to end child poverty, we must ensure all parents and caregivers have the resources to support and nurture their children: jobs with livable wages, affordable high-quality child care, supports for working families like the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and the Child Tax Credit (CTC), and safety nets for basic needs like nutrition and housing assistance.

Only 10 States Experienced Statistically Significant Drops in Child Poverty Since 2013

Ten states saw statistically significant decreases in child poverty, and in seven of them the decrease was less than 10 percent. Three states (Alaska, New Hampshire and North Dakota) saw statistically significant increases, and all increases were above 20 percent.

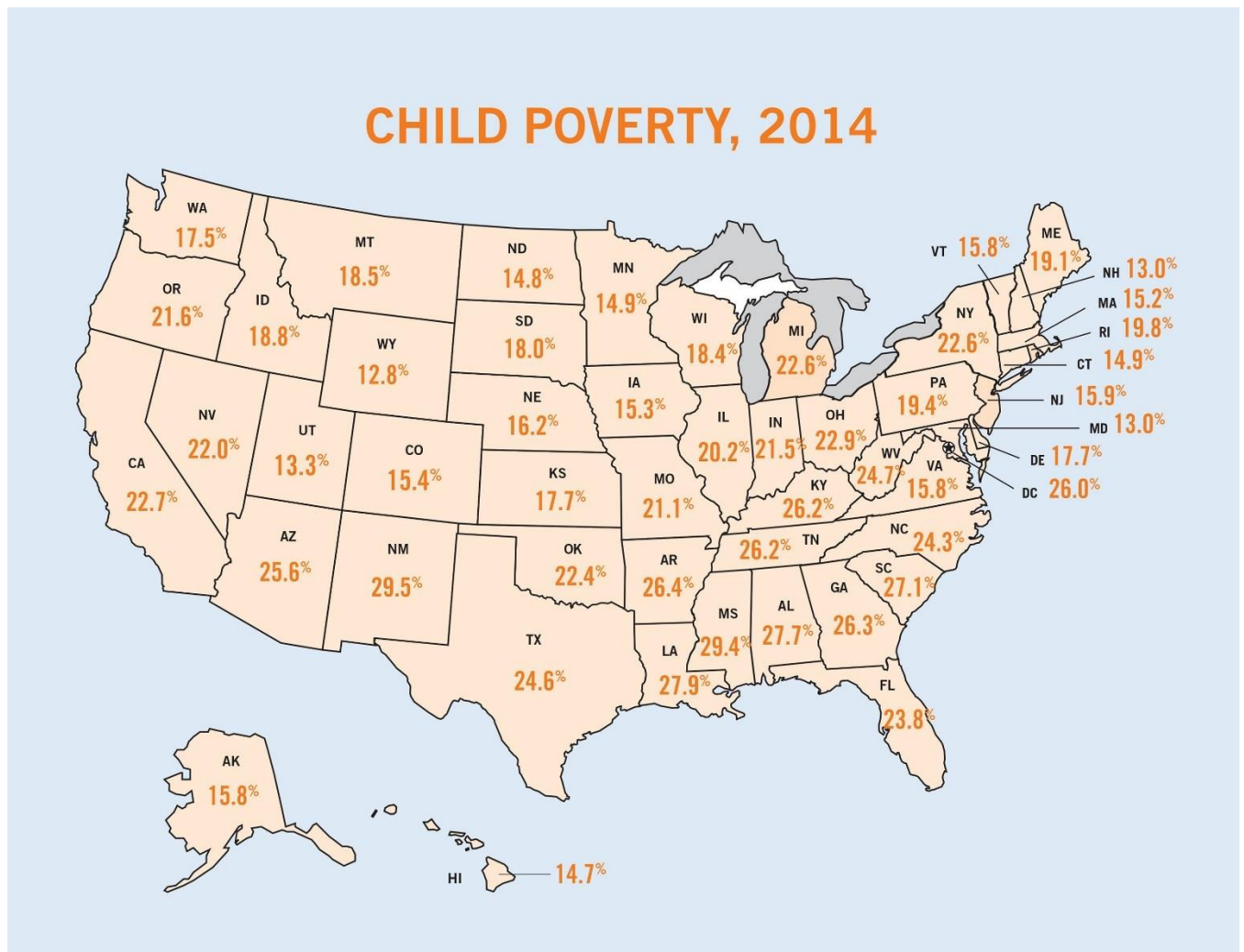

Child Poverty Rates in 2014

Child poverty ranges widely from state to state. In 2014, poverty rates for children ranged from 12.8 percent in Wyoming to 29.5 percent in New Mexico, meaning that a child in New Mexico was more than twice as likely to be poor as a child in Wyoming. In 10 states and the District of Columbia more than 25 percent of children were poor. Poverty is defined as an annual income below \$24,230 for the average family of four—\$2,019 a month, \$466 a week or \$66 a day.

Young Children Continue to Suffer from Higher Poverty Rates

In 2014, poverty rates for children under six years of age ranged from 13.8 percent in Hawaii to 33.8 percent in New Mexico. Except Hawaii and the District of Columbia, in all other states poverty in children under age six was higher than among all children under age 18. In 20 states, over 25 percent of children under age six — more than one in four — lived in poverty. In eight states, almost three in ten children under age six live in poverty. Only four states had fewer than 15 percent of young children in poverty.

Extreme Child Poverty

In 2014, the percent of children living in extreme poverty ranged from 4.8 percent in New Hampshire to 15.4 percent in Mississippi. In 19 states, and the District of Columbia, more than 10 percent of children lived in extreme poverty—which is defined as an annual income of less than half of the poverty level or \$12,115 a year, \$1,010 a month, \$233 a week or \$33 a day for the average family of four.

Extreme Child Poverty in Children Under Age Six

In 2014, the percent of children under age six living in extreme poverty ranged from 5.3 percent in Utah to 16.8 percent in both Mississippi and Louisiana. In 27 states, 10 percent or more of children under age six were extremely poor.

Child Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

Across the states, children of color continue to suffer disproportionately from poverty—with the youngest children of color experiencing the highest rates of poverty.

Black Children

- In 2014, poverty rates for Black children ranged from 17.2 percent in Hawaii to 51 percent in Alaska. In almost half of the states (22), 40 percent or more of Black children were poor. Only one state – Hawaii – has less than 20 percent of Black children living in poverty.

Hispanic Children

- At the national level, Hispanic children constitute the largest group of poor children. In 2014, poverty rates for Hispanic children ranged from 4.2 percent in Vermont to 47 percent in Alabama. In 32 states, more than three out of ten Hispanic children were living in poverty. Six states had Hispanic child poverty rates of 40 percent or more.

Asian Children

- Asian children had the lowest rate of child poverty. In 2014, the poverty rate for Asian children ranged from 1 percent in Delaware to 37.5 percent in Alaska. Only seven states had Asian child poverty rates above 20 percent. In 13 states, fewer than 10 percent of Asian children were poor.

American Indian/Alaska Native Children

- In 2014, the poverty rate for American Indian/Alaska Native children ranged from 3.4 percent in Maryland to 90.7 percent in Rhode Island. In 24 states, more than 30 percent of American Indian/Alaska Native children were poor.

Children of Two or More Races

- In 2014, the poverty rate for children of two or more races ranged from 11.4 percent in Wyoming to 41.2 percent in West Virginia. Twenty states had a poverty rate above 25 percent for children of two or more races.

White Non-Hispanic Children

- In 2014, poverty rates for White non-Hispanic children ranged from 5.6 percent in Connecticut to 23 percent in Kentucky. Only two states had more than one in five White non-Hispanic children living in poverty —Kentucky and West Virginia.
