

## All Children Need Health Coverage that is Affordable, Comprehensive, and Simple.

#### **Health Coverage for Nebraska's Children:**

- 43,000 children are uninsured (9.1% of all children).
- 164,560 children are enrolled in Medicaid.
- 47,922 children are enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). \*\*\*

## How affordable is health coverage for Nebraska's children? †

Children's eligibility is up to 200 percent of poverty (\$44,700 for a family of four) for all children through Nebraska's Medicaid expansion program (including CHIP).

## How simple are enrollment procedures in CHIP and Medicaid for Nebraska's children?

- Simplification procedures:
  - No face-to-face interview
  - No asset test
  - No waiting period
- Barriers that remain:
  - No 12-month continuous eligibility
  - 6 month renewal period for CHIP and Medicaid
  - No presumptive eligibility—which forces children to wait until their application is processed before they can see a doctor
  - No administrative verification of income—the state requires parents to provide proof of income before a child can get health coverage

## Do children in Nebraska's CHIP program receive the same comprehensive benefits as children in Medicaid?

Yes. Nebraska is one of 13 states (plus the District of Columbia) that has used CHIP funding to cover all children eligible for CHIP and Medicaid under one program. As a result, children in CHIP in these states receive the same comprehensive health and mental health coverage (through the Early and Periodic Screening Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit) that all children in Medicaid receive.
